The *South African Journal of Animal Science* is an open access, peer-reviewed journal for publication of original scientific articles and reviews in the field of animal science. The journal publishes reports of research dealing with production of farmed animal species (cattle, sheep, goats, pigs, horses, poultry and ostriches), as well as pertinent aspects of research on aquatic and wildlife species. Disciplines covered nutrition, genetics, physiology, and production systems. Systematic research on animal products, behaviour, and welfare are also invited. Rigorous testing of well-specified hypotheses is expected.

#### **Publication information**

The South African Journal of Animal Science is published electronically at <http://www.sasas.co.za/journals>. One volume will be published per year, consisting of at least six issues, published at approximately 2 month intervals. Articles will, be published as soon as the copy-ready version has been approved by the submitting author and the publication fee has been paid. Details of requirements for different categories of manuscripts and of the peer-review process are given in the Instructions to Authors which may be downloaded from the website address given above. Prospective authors should adhere strictly to the guidelines detailed in the Instructions to Authors. Manuscripts that are not written with proper English grammar and syntax or that do not fully comply with the style and format of the journal will not be accepted for review. The submission process is handled by an Online Journal Management System to facilitate the Journal submission and review process (<http://journals.sasas.co.za/>). In all cases, submissions should represent original contributions to current scientific knowledge of the principles and of the application of principles governing the functioning of animals and their relationship to the social or physical environment.
